The three-day workshop focussed on preparations for their presentation to NT Cabinet Ministers. This included group discussions, presentations, and individual time to finalise their speeches. Members practised their public speaking skills, including a mock panel rehearsal activity.

Members confirmed their topics and worked to transform their research and notes into relevant speeches. The four topics raised with Cabinet were:

- Water Security
- Water Quality
- Housing
- Roads



The term 'First Circles' combines two concepts:

- Acknowledgement of 'First Peoples'
- The use of 'Circles' represents the collaboration between people and communities being the main driver to improve outcomes.

Members met with the Chief Minister, Deputy Chief Minister, Minister for Aboriginal Affairs and five other Ministers to discuss key issues impacting remote Aboriginal communities. Solutions and opportunities were highlighted for government to better work with remote communities on a range of projects, policies, and programs. Despite plenty of pre speech nerves, members spoke confidently, and strongly expressed their key community matters.

The Hon Steve Edgington MLA, Minister for Aboriginal Affairs, hosted an evening of celebrations to mark the completion of the 2024 program and to recognise the 10th year of the First Circles Program.







Following a 'Welcome to Country' delivered by Larrakia woman Jeaneen McLennan and a didgeridoo performance by Les Huddleston, Minister Edgington congratulated 2024 First Circles members on their hard work and commitment throughout the program. He encouraged members to continue their leadership journeys and to encourage others in their communities to do the same.

This year, 9 Aboriginal leaders from remote communities in the Northern Territory participated in the program to develop and expand their leadership skills.

Since April 2024, members have participated in four workshops and three regional engagement sessions. They have strengthened their voices and built skills to speak confidently and directly with government about matters affecting their communities.
